

## **Key Messages**

"It's just pointless to tell young people from Edinburgh to not drink alcohol or have sex. Sooner or later they are going to be tempted or pressured to do it because sex and drink is everywhere – they need support to say "no I'm not ready" or advice on how they do it safely.
